




Tucholke, Genevieve. Wink Poppy Midnight.


Cline, Ernest. Ready Player One.


Ruby, Laura. Bone Gap.


Dellaira, Ava. Love Letters to the Dead.

Laurel's first English assignment is to write a letter to a dead person. Her first letter to Kurt Cobain, her sister's favorite, but she does not turn it in. Laurel chooses to continue writing to dead people--Amy Winehouse, Heath Ledger, Judy Garland--about the hardships of being a teenager and, most importantly, May's tragedy. Laurel's letter-writing proves to be cathartic and allows her to face her own tragedy and come to terms with what happened to May. (Realistic Fiction)



Ng, Celeste. Little Fires Everywhere.

This one is for more advanced readers, and is a starred review by School Library Journal. In Shaker Heights, a wealthy suburb of Cleveland, drama unfolds between the Richardson family of six and their two tenants who are new to the area. Secrets abound in this story with complex and sympathetic characters. (Mystery/Realistic Fiction)



Sanchez, Erika L. I Am Not Your Perfect Mexican Daughter.

A National Book Award Finalist, this story follows Julia - a 15-year old from Mexico who is anxious to gain some teenage independence from her undocumented parents. It's a complex and detailed coming-of-age story that's told in format of a diary. (Realistic Fiction)



Krakauer, Jon. Into Thin Air.

Jon Krakauer narrates his terrifying climbing adventure to the summit of Mount Everest in May of 1996. Once he climbs to the summit, a dangerous storm starts to form and the lives that it affects will never be the same. (Nonfiction)



Lewis, John and Andrew Aydin. March: Books One-Three.

In this graphic novel trilogy, Congressman John Lewis recounts his first-hand experiences during the Civil Rights Movement. From his childhood in Alabama, to the Bloody Sunday in 1963, Lewis recounts the struggles so many experienced in the fight for civil rights. (Nonfiction)




Bardugo, Leigh. Six of Crows.

Kaz Brekker is a criminal mastermind living in a city where corruption and crime rule supreme. Kaz is presented with the opportunity of a lifetime--pull of the heist of a lifetime. Kaz must kidnap the creator of a highly addictive substance, which will upset the balance of power. Kaz recruits a group of five other young people to take on the heist. Can the six of them pull of the heist and reap the rewards, or will their personality clashes be their own undoing? This is the first book of a trilogy. (Adventure/Fantasy)




Maas, Sarah. A Court of Thorn and Roses.

Taken to a magical kingdom for the murder of a faerie, Feyre's heart gives way to strong feelings for her captor. Surrounded by danger, Feyre must fight to break an ancient curse, or risk losing love forever. (Fantasy)



Pausch, Randy. The Last Lecture.

This book is about the reflections of a Carnegie Mellon Computer Science Professor who was asked to give a lecture before he retired. The lecture was given shortly after he was diagnosed with terminal cancer. The lecture he gave was not about dying but rather about the importance of overcoming obstacles, of enabling the dreams of others, of seizing every moment, because "time is all you have... and you may find one day that you have less than you think." (Nonfiction)



Lester, Julius. Day of Tears.

Pierce Butler, notorious gambler and slave owner, hosts a massive slave auction after losing his fortune. He breaks his promise to his most valued slave, Emma, and rips apart her family. This lyrical, heartbreaking tale tells the story of one of the largest slave auctions in history and the tragedy of losing loved ones. (Historical Fiction)
