


Characteristics of the Antebellum South

- 1. Primarily agrarian.
- 2. Economic power shifted from the "upper South" to the "lower South."
- 3. "Cotton Is King!"
 * 1860→ 5 mil. bales a yr.
 (57% of total US exports).
- 4. Very slow development of industrialization.
- 5. Rudimentary financial system.
- 6. Inadequate transportation system.

The "Plain Folk" [white yeoman farmers]








Founded in 1845, it was the South's first attempt at industrialization in Richmond, VA


Slaves Picking Cotton on a Mississippi Plantation




Slaves Using the Cotton Gin



Changes in Cotton Production




Value of Cotton Exports As % of All US Exports







Antebellum Southern Plantation Phile

Slave-Owning Population (1850)







US Taws Regarding Slavery

- 1. U. S. Constitution:
 - * 3/5s compromise [I.2]
 - * fugitive slave clause [IV.2] 1.0
 - * slave trade "punt" until 1808

1. 1793 → Fugitive Slave Act. 2.0

2. 1850 → stronger Fugitive Slave Act.3.0

Southern Slavery--> An Aberration?

- 1780s: 1st antislavery society created in Phila.
- By 1804: slavery eliminated from last northern state.
- 1807: the legal termination of the slave trade, enforced by the Royal Navy.
- 1820s: newly indep. Republics of Central & So. America declared their slaves free.
- 1833: slavery abolished throughout the British Empire.
- 1844: slavery abolished in the Fr. colonies.
- 1861: the serfs of Russia were emancipated.

Slave esistance Olprisings

Slave Resistance

1. "SAMBO" pattern of behavior used as a charade in front of whites [the innocent, laughing black man caricature - bulging eyes, thick lips, big smile, etc.].





Slave Resistance

- 2. Refusal to work hard.
- 3. Isolated acts of sabotage.
- 4. Escape via the Underground Railroad.










The Culture of Slavery
