In each homeroom, class meetings are held in grades K-5. Students are provided with opportunities to express their opinions and discuss solutions for bullying situations with their peers.

When individual students choose to bully other students, negative consequences will be issued. Hosack's Ladder of Discipline/Code of Conduct for bullying situations is as follows:

- First Incident: Verbal warning to student; Teacher completes Bullying Reporting Form
- Second Incident: Behavior Report completed by staff; Loss of privileges; Parent contacted by teacher; Referral to school counselor
- 3. Third Incident: Behavior Report completed by staff; Referral to school Principal; Parent contacted by Principal; Possible referral to the Elementary Student Assistance Program (ESAP).
- ⇒ Positive consequences will also be recognized for students who report and try to prevent bullying. All students will continue to be recognized for their kindness to others, as well as their efforts to

keep Hosack a caring school environment!



What is the Definition of Bullying?

Bullying is when a person repeatedly and on purpose says or does mean or hurtful things to another person, who has a difficult time defending himself/herself. Further, bullying is aggressive behavior that involves unwanted, negative actions. It implies an imbalance of power, and typically involves a pattern of behavior repeated over time.

Bullying can take on many forms:


- Direct Bullying (usually faceto-face confrontation-namecalling, teasing, threatening gestures, hitting, kicking, shoving, spitting)
- Indirect Bullying (subtle aggressive acts-social exclusion, rumors, cyber-bullying)

What is the Olweus Bullying Prevention Program?

The Olweus Bullying Prevention Program (OBPP) is a research-based program that reduces and prevents bullying in schools. The program addresses the topic of bullying at the schoolwide, classroom, individual, and community levels. The OBPP helps to create a positive environment in schools, where students can feel safe and learn new skills. Hosack teachers and staff have been trained to utilize the program components and strategies, in an effort to address bullying incidents. All Hosack students will follow these four antibullying rules:

- 1. We will not bully others.
- 2. We will try to help students who are bullied.
- We will try to include students who are left out.
- If we know that somebody is being bullied, we will tell an adult at school and an adult at home.
