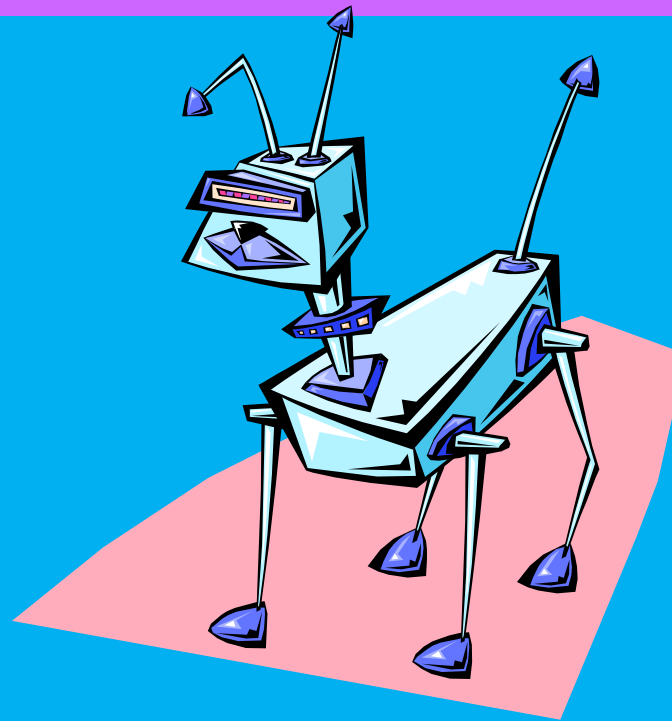

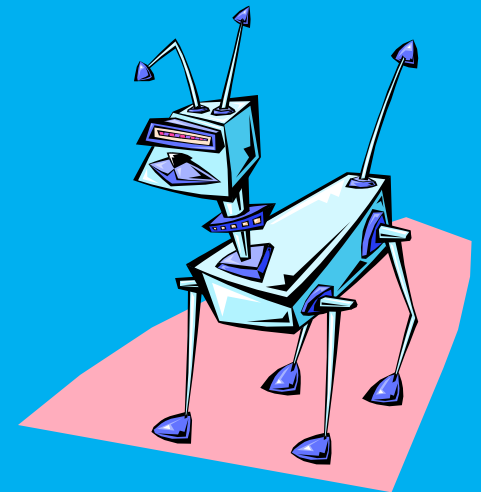

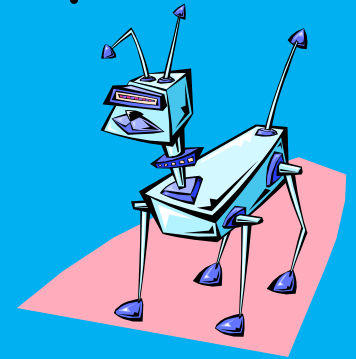

And its secrets that I keep.

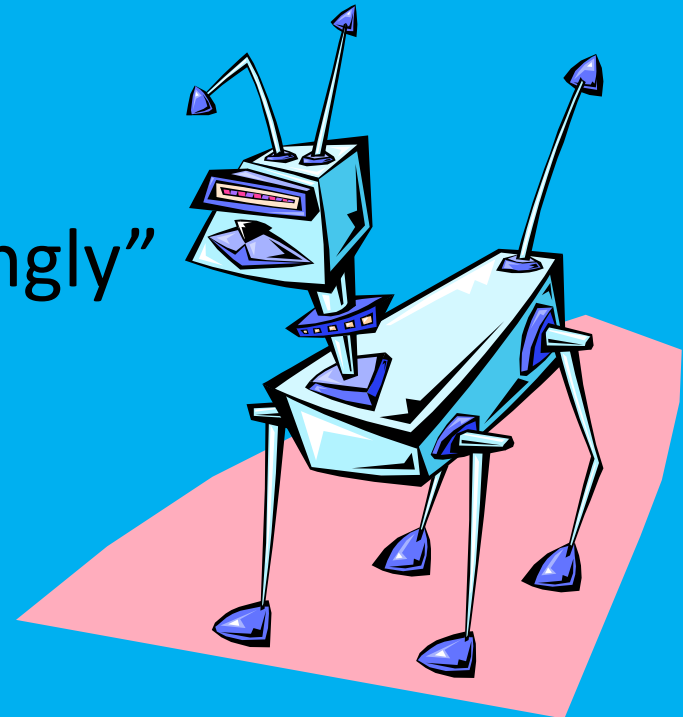

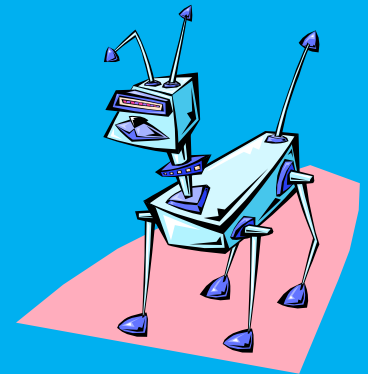
Review Prefixes: pre-, mis-, in-

- A prefix is a word part that can be added to the beginning of a word.
- Prefixes change the meaning of the word to which they are added.
- pre- means “before”
- mis- means “badly” or “wrongly”
- in- means “not”

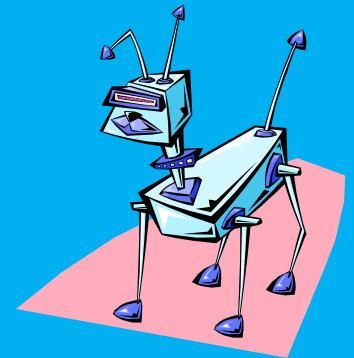

Focus Skill: Cause and Effect

- Asking a *what* question can help you find an effect.

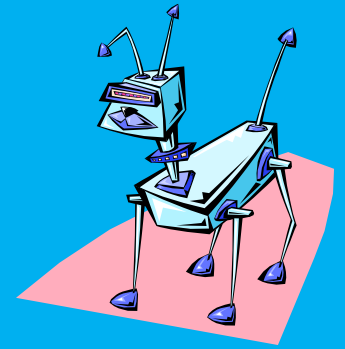

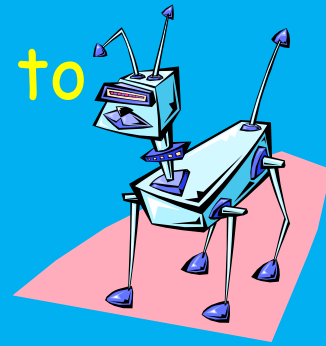
Author's Message

- The **author's message** in a piece of nonfiction writing is the main idea he or she wants the reader to learn or understand.
- To identify the message, it is often helpful to ask why the author thinks the information is important.

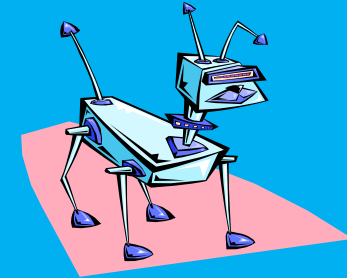

- Present-tense verbs describe action that is happening now.

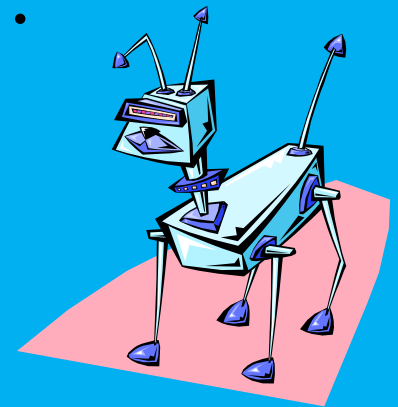


- Jaime walks to school.
